(Full year course for 3 college credits)

COURSE OUTLINE

Course Description: The French 4 Honors Conversation class is designed to build on students' previous knowledge and to develop confidence in oral and written communication. It also aims to deepen students' understanding and appreciation of French culture through the study and discussion of selected French writings. Through this course, students further develop their proficiency in the language through the integration of their listening, reading, speaking, and writing skills. The course materials have been selected to provide a focal point for discussion and to provide a window into French culture through its Literature and film. Students also get opportunities to become proficient in coping in everyday situations such as might be encountered during travel.

GOALS:

- develop oral fluency
- expand students' vocabulary
- develop the confidence to handle common situations encountered during travel
- develop students' ability to discuss simple and complex topics in French
- develop ease in reading and comprehending intermediate to advanced written works in French
- develop an understanding of French culture through examples of its literature, film and song
- develop students' ability to think critically

SPEAKING

This course provides opportunities for the development of fluency in the language through regular practice in the language lab. During the course of the school year students will practice speaking through a variety of activities that include:

- Daily reflections and discussions on the texts being read and studied at the time
- Formal and informal presentations on topics and themes discussed.
- Informal presentations of students' personal opinions on various topics •
- Interviews based on previously read material from French magazines and newspapers or • students' interests.
- Dramatizations and role play •
- Presentations of projects •

LISTENING

Students continue to perfect their listening skills by watching and discussing, orally and in writing, French and francophone movies, and listening to contemporary French language songs that are related to our themes of study. This exposure provides further reinforcement and opportunities for discovery of the French language and culture through film and song.

WRITING

Essays are written on most major themes studied throughout the year, as well as all films viewed.

READINGS

This course provides opportunities for extensive reading comprehension through the study of two full length literary works, <u>The Little Prince</u> by Antoine De Saint -Exupery and <u>No Exit</u> by Jean-Paul Sartre, which make up the core texts for the course. In addition, selected poems and articles are studied. The study of the two core texts provides unity to the course but allows class discussions to extend to include various topics from literature, current events, and personal experiences. In addition to the reading and analysis of our core texts, readings for the course are pulled from French newspapers, magazines, and the Internet.

ASSESSMENTS

- Students complete a Little Prince workbook which is used to guide and facilitate conversation about the themes generated from the study of the literary work. This workbook is evaluated throughout the study of the novel and a grade is attributed.
- Students' oral ability is assessed periodically in our state of the art learning laboratory and students are graded on their responses to questions previously explored in class.
- Students complete a major project on the Little Prince at the end of the reading and analysis of the book.
- There is ongoing evaluation based on day to day student participation in in-class discussion.
- Role-play
- Essays
- Vocabulary quizzes
- Projects
- Formative assessment includes ongoing participation and conversations in class centered around the identified themes.
